



As we enter the month of July, and celebrate our nation's independence this Sunday, it is a good time to remember a unique thing about being labeled "Baptist." Baptists have always championed religious liberty, not just for themselves but for all people. Historically, it has been our issue.

Englishman Thomas Helwys (maybe the first Baptist pastor) advocated for full religious liberty and paid for his stand with imprisonment and probably death. He published in 1612 his "A Short Declaration of the Mystery of Iniquity" (addressed to King James), in which he upheld universal religious liberty, freedom of conscience for all, and declared that "whether men be heretics, Turks, Jews, or whatever, the earthly power had no power to punish them for their views or to be intolerant of them."

Early American Baptists Roger Williams and John Clarke co-founded Providence, RI and established it as a place of religious liberty. The first Jewish Synagogue was founded there.

The First Amendment to the US Constitution, which guaranteed religious liberty for all, was made largely upon the insistence of the Baptists of Virginia.

We may have grown to take it for granted living where we live, but I agree with Christian cultural analyst Rod Dreher, it will become the central issue of our day.

So it becomes important to ask, "What is religious liberty?

Religious liberty is the right of every person to worship God as their conscience dictates, to include being free to not to worship God if one chooses not to do so.... It is equality before the law of all belief systems. It is also important to understand that religious liberty is not religious toleration. Toleration is a privilege granted by man, liberty is a right bestowed by God.

Thomas Jefferson wrote in the Declaration of Independence, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

And the First Amendment to the US Constitution states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech..."

But a free state does not create religious liberty. It only recognizes and respects it.

The reality of God and the truth of the Scriptures attests that all people are created in the image of God and bestowed by God the freedom to obey or not as free moral agents (Genesis 1:27; 2:7, 16-17; 3:1-).

God continues to intervene in the affairs of men, providing ultimate freedom through the person of Jesus Christ. Those who are in Christ are free from sin, death, and the law (John 8:36; Romans 6:1-23). Volume 1, Issue 107

In Christ we are called to be good citizens of the state, to give to the government what belongs to the government, and to never use our God given freedom to harm another person or deprive them of their rights. But we are also to give to God what is God's (which is ourselves) and if man's law and God's law ever come into conflict, we must obey God (Matt 22:15-21; Acts 4:19-20; Rom 13:1-7; Gal 5:1,13).

The ideal we seek is a free church in a free state. A philosopher stated, and I agree, that the Christian world view is the only view that can produce that.

So why does religious liberty matter?

First, it matters because religious liberty comes from God and not man. Second. it fulfills the "Golden Rule" (Matt 7:12). I am obligated to give to others, even those who disagree with me, the same freedoms I desire for myself. Third, our Baptist ancestors paid for our liberty through their own courageous acts of freedom that cost them both prison and in some cases their lives. Finally, Religious liberty aids in the mission of the church to make disciples of all nations. We are free to live out our faith in the public square and share our faith with others freely.

In Herschel Hobbs' commentary on the Baptist Faith and Message (1963), he states: "Baptist hold to certain specific beliefs... the lordship of Jesus Christ and the authority of the Scriptures and the divine compulsion to preach the gospel. But they grant every person the right to be free to believe as they want. But only insist upon the same right for themselves (p. 9-10).
